COUNCILORS' REPORT- ALAN EHRLICH & JIM CARVER

252nd MEETING – PHILADELPHIA

The Council has three petitions for amendments to the Bylaws on its agenda. One was up for consideration in San Diego and is now up for Action - to extend the Unemployed Members' Dues Waiver from two years to three years in one-year increments. Two petitions have been filed and are on the Council Agenda for consideration only. One is a Petition for Removal of Officers and Councilors for neglect of duties or misconduct. The other is a Petition on the Rights of Affiliates that is intended to clarify the language of current Bylaws. These petitions will be up for action at the Council Meeting in San Francisco in April, 2017.

A Special Discussion Item will again be on the agenda – Gathering [Council] Input on Proposed Recommendations of the ACS Presidential Task Force on the U.S. Employment of Chemists. This complements the San Diego Special Discussion Item and will discuss major outcomes from the Task Force's recommendations. A final report will be assembled after the meeting.

Congratulations are in order for a member of CHAL who is receiving an award at the National Meeting in Philadelphia. Treasurer and Past-President Brian Meadows has been named an ACS Fellow. The Fellows induction ceremony and reception are Monday afternoon, August 22, 2016 with reception to follow.

CHAL AWARDS

The Howard and Sally Peters Award for Non-Traditional Careers in Chemistry

The Chemistry and the Law (CHAL) Division of ACS has established an award regarding non-traditional careers in chemistry in honor of chemists Howard and Sally Peters—long-term members of the Santa Clara Valley Local Section. This is the first award established by CHAL in more than twenty years, and it was presented for the first time to both Howard and Sally to recognize their significant lifetime contributions to non-traditional careers in chemistry. Howard has laboratory research experience in high explosives at SRI International, Menlo Park and is now retired after a 30-year career as a patent attorney in the Silicon Valley. Sally has laboratory research experience at Geneva College, Beaver Falls, PA and the Department of Chemistry at Stanford University. She is now retired after 28 years as a chemical information specialist with XEROX PARC in Palo Alto, CA. The award presentation occurred at a dinner following the CHAL Executive Committee meeting held on Sunday, August 19, 2012 during the 244th American Chemical Society National Meeting in Philadelphia, PA. It was first announced at the CHAL reception held Monday, August 20, 2012 at the Chemical Heritage Foundation.



OFFICER REPORTS

COUNCILORS' REPORT CONT'D

The Council will elect members to its three elected committees, the Committee on Committees (CONC), the Committee on Nominations & Elections (N&E) and the Council Policy Committee (CPC). Your councilor, Alan Ehrlich, has served on CPC for the past several years, and as its vice-chair for the past three years. He must rotate off of that committee and has been nominated to serve on N&E. Your other councilor, James Carver, continues to serve as chair of the Council Committee on Constitution and Bylaws (C&B).

251st MEETING – SAN DIEGO COUNCIL

In San Diego the Council chose Peter Dorhout and Thomas Gilbert as candidates for President-Elect for 2017. There were no petition candidates. Dorhout and Gilbert will stand for election in the Fall National Election.

Council members from District II (Mid-west) and District IV (South) selected candidates for District Directors on the Board of Directors for 2017-2019. George Bodner and Christina Bodurow were chosen from District II and Rigoberto Hernandez and Larry Krannich were chosen for District IV. There were no petition candidates. Bodner and Bodurow will stand for election in District II and Hernandez and Krannich will stand for election in District IV in the Fall National Election.

The Committee on Nominations and Elections chose four candidates for Director-at-large for 2017-2019 – Joseph Heppert, Kristin Omberg, Dorothy Phillips and Kathleen Schulz. There were no petition candidates. Councilors will choose two of the four in the Fall National Election. A Town Hall Meeting with the four candidates will be held on Sunday, August 21 from 4:30-5:30 in Liberty Salon A/B of the Philadelphia Marriott. The meeting is open to all registrants, although Councilors are the only eligible voters in the Fall.

The Council voted to set the member dues for 2016 at the fully escalated rate of \$166. This rate is established pursuant to an inflation-adjustment formula in the ACS Constitution and Bylaws.

The Council approved amended Academic Professional Guidelines, which have subsequently been ratified by the Board of Directors. The guidelines will apply to those members of the academic community whose job function impacts directly or indirectly on scientists practicing the profession of chemistry.

The Committee on Nominations and Elections has established a Vote 20/20 Task Force, charged with examining all aspects of nominations and elections for ACS national offices, and designing an enhanced process to be in place by the year 2020. The committee welcomed ideas from all members as to how nominations and elections should be handled.

BOARD OF DIRECTORS

On the recommendation of the Committee on Grants and Awards, the Board voted to approve an endowment to support the E. Bright Wilson Award in Spectroscopy. The Board also voted to approve language to be included in the guiding documents for the National Awards and Fellows Program to allow for the rescission of national awards and the ACS Fellows designations where reasonable grounds exist.

The Board held a well-attended open session which featured Amy Harmon, a reporter for the New York Times, who covers the social implications of science and technology. Ms. Harmon's topic was "Telling Science Stories: Dispatch from the Conflict Zone."

FIND COMPOUNDS IN PATENTS QUICKLY WITH PATENTPAKTM By Elaine Cheeseman (June 20, 2016)

Finding the relevant information in a patent that is hundreds and sometimes thousands of pages long is tedious and time-consuming. For chemical substances, an innovative solution is now available that eliminates the need to search page by page to find the information you need. With PatentPakTM from CAS, a single click takes you directly to the page on which the substance is discussed.

By leveraging the indexing applied by CAS scientists, PatentPak pinpoints the location of substances in patents and patent applications from 31 patent authorities. PatentPak is available in classic STN® and in SciFinder®.

PatentPak provides three resources to enable you to locate and analyze patents more quickly: PDF, PDF+, and PatentPak Interactive. The PDF is the original document from the different patent offices. The PDF+ is a PDF enhanced with a table at the end of the document that gives the mark numbers, page numbers of the compounds, the CAS Registry Numbers®, chemical names, and the structures. The table can easily be printed and saved for future reference. PatentPak Interactive provides access to a version of the PDF that has been annotated by CAS scientists via a substance viewer which displays the chemical structures of substances and their corresponding location in the document. Note that structures are available even when a chemical structure was not included in the original document. You can then conveniently share your findings with colleagues or other stakeholders – even if they do not use STN.

Figure 1 shows an example of a CAplusSM record with all three types of links.

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
